OPEN AND AFFIRMING DISCERNMENT TO BEGIN SOON!

As you hopefully know, the Olivet Board of Directors, in cooperation with our Pastoral Staff and Christian Education Committee, agreed last Fall to begin the process of discerning whether or not Olivet is to officially achieve the designation as an "Open and Affirming Congregation." We fully realize that there are many questions and emotions among you as to what this means for the life of our church. Thus, we are designating 6 weeks during the season of Lent to that shared learning and dialogue process. The first meeting will take place on Wednesday, February 27, from 5:30 PM – 7:15 PM. We will begin with a soup and salad meal, with the class to follow. Concurrent alternative Lenten activities will be offered for youth. Skipping the ensuing week to observe Ash Wednesday, we will resume on March 13 and continue on successive Wednesdays through April 10th. Please also understand that your presence and voice are vital to this process. Ultimately this matter will result in a final, congregational vote. It is critically important that all of us come together to discern where God's love is calling us to act on this defining issue of our time. Without your participation our efforts to find the proper way forward will be greatly diminished.



Too few Christians plumb the depths of the liturgical calendar from year to year. The central feature of that process, of course, comes in walking with the Revised Common Lectionary from week to week. Through the Lectionary we are not only provided with an easily accessible pathway for encountering the entirety of the Scriptures every three years, but we also find a

prime opportunity for reabsorbing the biblical story of Jesus, his Disciples and the early Church. Each liturgical year begins, naturally, with the Advent and Christmas stories, which we just revivified again over the past 2 months. Currently, we are in the season of "Epiphany," which begins with the story of the Wise Men, their journey to Bethlehem, and their own realization that, in this poor child born in a barn to refugee parents, God has reasserted kingship over the whole of the creation.

Yet, the story of Epiphany doesn't stop there. Jesus, too, we soon learn, had his own epiphanic moments. In the weeks following Epiphany Sunday, the Lectionary told the story of Jesus' baptism and his own acceptance of his earthly calling. (We often forget that Jesus, too, had to decide whether or not to follow God's calling in his life.) This Sunday and last, moreover, the Lectionary follows Jesus through Luke's telling as he returns home to Nazareth to formally announce the beginning of his ministry.

Reflecting on these Lectionary stories has inspired fitting spiritual meditations within me at a similar place in my own journey. More specifically, I find myself thinking during this season about what it means to be called by Jesus into pastoral ministry. Once again, I am reminded through Jesus' story that being a Pastor is a sacred calling. It is more than a job, it is a way of being that seeks to model the love of Christ through sacrifice, service and humble presence. What's more, after nearly two decades in ministry I remember again an important truth that several veteran Pastors shared with me when I was just starting out; being a Pastor, they said in some form or another, can be a supremely rewarding life, but it's also "one of the utmost challenging professions in the world." They told me this because they wanted me to know exactly what I was getting myself into.

Indeed, they were utterly correct. Pastoral ministry is, at once, both tremendously rewarding and enormously challenging. It is the most profound of privileges to walk with someone as they get married or welcome a new child into the world. Yet it is also quite a heavy load to bear in moments of crisis. And, for me, both realities are most present in helping congregants deal with the experience of their own mortality. From my own point of view, the highest of all privileges comes in providing comfort to those who must face death, and walking with them and their families as they search for God in the midst of their deepest pain and sorrow. In fact, at no other point do I experience the full weight and responsibility of the pastoral office more than when I stand before a casket as it is closed for the final time knowing that I will be the last person to see the earthly body of

Many of you noticed that Advent Awakenings looked a little bit different this past December. Instead of gathering for a meal and then going our separate ways to participate in a variety of classes, we tried something new. After eating together in the fellowship hall we all moved together to the multipurpose room, where we - children, youth, and

adults - sat around tables, prayed together, read scripture together, did activities together, and participated in discussion together. Preschoolers shared their prayers for peace, hope, joy, and love with seniors and vice-versa. Adults helped children construct Advent wreathes and children infused their special brand of creativity into the task. We sang our favorite Christmas carols, retold the Nativity story in our own special ways, and hopefully, everyone learned a little something new about God and the community that gathers at Olivet.

More and more, research on faith communities is showing that these intergenerational interactions are vitally important to faith formation and congregational wholeness. It turns out, generations need one another. Intergenerational ministry empowers multiple generations to mutually invest in each other and in the community; it encourages deep relationship-building that plays an invaluable role in the development of lifelong disciples; and it brings renewal of energy and vitality to the entire congregation.

The Christian Education team will continue to offer various opportunities for intergenerational interactions - this is something the people of Olivet have always been good at. And in the meantime, I encourage you to introduce yourself to a child whose name you can't remember, ask them how they've seen God at work in the past week, and share with them a bit of your own story. You may be surprised by what develops.

THE NOISINESS OF OFFERINGS

A pastor in Alabama tells the story about one of the ushers rummaging through the offering plates after worship. As the concerned pastor approached the situation, the usher said,



"Don't worry! I'm not embezzling the offering. One of the kids from the church bus put buttons in the offering plate." The bus brought kids from a more modest part of town to worship each Sunday. The pastor thought he would put a stop to this nonsense by finding out who was putting the buttons in the plate.

He approached the bus full of kids and said, "Who placed these buttons in the offering plate?" A very shy little girl with big green eyes slowly raised her hand and said, "I did, Pastor." When he asked why she had done that, she replied with tears in her eyes, "I didn't mean to do anything bad. I just wanted to make an offering to God, like you said we should. But I don't have any money like the other people. So I asked my Momma what could I give and she gave me those buttons from her sewing box. She said maybe somebody could use the buttons to help someone make some clothes."

The pastor assured the little girl that she had done nothing wrong and thanked her for the gift. It sort of reminds us of the story of the widow's mite. The pastor initially failed to understand the value of the little girl's offering. On a larger scale we could ask, "Is the offering of worship and prayer in a small church any less important, any less valuable than the mega-church down the road?" It's not about the size of the offering. It's about what's in your heart and knowing that you are giving your very best and giving to glorify God.

All gifts are important and represent a level of faithfulness and dedication. Gifts go far beyond what we put in the offering plate. There are gifts of time and talent needed throughout ALL the ministries of the church. Have you made an assessment lately of your giving? I'm not advocating for buttons in the offering plate, but a reminder that regardless of the sounds......the sound of your voice in the choir; the clatter of your hands serving at Loaves and Fishes; your time commitment to leadership positions or assisting with Room at the Inn; your attendance and/or teaching Sunday school; supporting our youth; the clanking of change; the silence of the dollar; and maybe even buttons; it all works together to fulfill God's plan and mission for this church. Are you making a sufficient amount of noise with your offerings?

EMBRACING THE GOOD NEWS FOR PLANET EARTH

As a Green Chalice congregation, Olivet members and friends seek to live sustainably and to partner with God and neighbor for stewardship of the earth and its resources - living in ways that are socially acceptable, economically wise, and environmentally protective on behalf of both current and future generations.

In these days of online shopping, with instant access to goods and services from around the world, do local food systems and local businesses really matter? Do they play a role in enabling us to live in ways that are 'economically wise' and 'environmentally protective'? In what ways do they help strengthen a community's economy and multi-faceted connections?

An upcoming University of Missouri Extension workshop – Growing Local Food Economies: Good Food, Good Business on Thursday, February 21 from 9:30 AM to 3:30 PM will explore connections between local food and local economies at four sites across the state - Kansas City, St. Louis, Columbia and Springfield. The morning session will feature a webinar keynote presentation and discussion with Dr. Becca Jablonski from Colorado State University.

Each site will have their own afternoon discussion featuring local panelists and presenters. Here in Columbia, the focus will be on how to build a more inclusive and diverse food system with Tricia Woolbright from the Columbia Center for Urban Agriculture and Nick Butler from the Center for Health Policy at MU. The Columbia workshop will be held at the MU Extension Service - Boone County office, 1012 N. Highway UU, just south of the I-70 Midway exit.

This workshop is open to anyone interested in exploring the potential economic impacts of local food, farming, and related activities – consumers, farmers, economic developers, policy makers, entrepreneurs, local and state government, and non-profit organizations.
